Thematic and disciplinary paths

From the second year of LLCER Bachelor, thematic and disciplinary courses are proposed (e.g. Anthropology, Religion, Political Issues, etc.). These courses are available for exchange students.

Language prerequisites:

French: B1 minimum acquired

Choice of courses

Exchange students can follow both LLCER undergraduate and postgraduate course.

The Japanese, Hindi and Korean language courses are closed to exchange students for the academic year 2020/21. These courses may still be closed to exchange students for the academic year 2021/2022. For further information, you can contact the Incoming Students Coordinators.

French as a Foreign Language (FLE) courses

Language prerequisites

French level: A1 minimum acquired

Before the beginning of the semester, students will be asked to take an online test to determine exactly which Inalco courses are best suited to their level. Therefore, students do not decide which level they will take and are placed on the courses that correspond to their ability, determined by the Inalco faculty.

Course list

General Courses

- Written French (Level A2, B1, B2): 3 hours/week - 6 ECTS credits
- Spoken French (Level A2, B1, B2): 3 hours/week - 6 ECTS credits

Complementary Courses

- A2 Phonetic Correction: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- A2 Language and Culture: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- B1 Grammar: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- B1 Workshop: Current Affairs and Media: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- B2 Grammar: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- B2/C1 Culture, History and Society: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- C1 Literature in the French Language: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- C1 Spoken and Written French: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits
- C1 Academic French: 1.5 hours/week - 3 ECTS credits

Choice of courses

Exchange students must choose one of the following options:

- Option 1: Written French (2 courses) + Spoken French (2 courses) \Rightarrow 4 courses
- Option 2: 1 to 4 courses selected from the complementary courses list (from level B2 only)
- Option 3: Written French (2 courses) and Spoken French (2 courses) + 1 to 2 courses selected from the complementary courses list \Rightarrow 5/6 courses
- Option 4: Written French (2 courses) or Spoken French (2 courses) + 3 to 4 courses chosen from the complementary courses list \Rightarrow 5/6 courses

Students enrolled for the academic year will be expected to follow the same level throughout the year. It is therefore not possible to take B1 level courses in the first semester and B2 level courses in the second semester.

Professional Track courses

Students wishing to enroll on a Professional Track have to apply for this by submitting additional documents to their original application. The admission results for these courses will be sent to candidates at the same time as the letter of admission.

Students whose application for a Professional Track has been accepted may enroll on courses for the Professional Track they have been accepted to.

Professional track courses are not open to students who have not applied for them nor been accepted.

Only the professional tracks courses mentioned in this document are open to exchange students.

Professional Track Course: International Relations

Admission requirements

- ✓ Provide certification of the following level of French: C1 minimum acquired
- ✓ Provide certification of the following level of English: B2 minimum acquired
- ✓ Include the following documents with the Application Form:
 - Certificate of French level C1 (DALF – attestation from the home university)
 - Certificate of English level B2 (TOEFL – IELTS – TOEIC)
 - A CV in French or English
 - A letter of motivation in French
 - Previous academic transcripts
- ✓ Be admitted by the faculty of the International Relations track

Course choice

Students accepted for the International Relations track will be able to register for any undergraduate courses taught in French.

The students accepted for the International Relations track who provide B2 level in English can enroll on courses taught in English.

Professional Track Course: International Business

Admission requirements

- ✓ Provide certification of the following level of French: C1 minimum acquired
- ✓ Include the following documents with the Application Form:
 - Certificate of French level C1 (DALF – attestation from the home university)
 - A CV in French
 - A letter of motivation in French
 - Previous academic transcripts
- ✓ Be admitted by the faculty of the International Business track

- ✓ Include the following documents with the Application Form:
 - Certificate of French level C1 (DALF – attestation from the home university)
 - A CV in French
 - A letter of motivation in French
 - Previous academic transcripts
- ✓ Be admitted by the faculty of the International Communication and Training track

Course choice

Students accepted for the Intercultural Communication and Training track will be able to register for any undergraduate courses.

Professional Track Course: Language Didactics

Admission requirements

- ✓ Provide certification of the following level of French: C1 minimum acquired
- ✓ Include the following documents with the Application Form:
 - Certificate of French level C1 (DALF – attestation from the home university)
 - A CV in French
 - A letter of motivation in French
 - Previous academic transcripts
- ✓ Be admitted by the faculty of the Language Didactics track

Language Didactics

Students accepted for the Language Didactics track will be able to register for any undergraduate courses.

Professional Track Course: Multilingual Natural Language Processing

Admission requirements

- ✓ Provide certification of the following level of French: B2 minimum acquired
- ✓ Include the following documents with the Application Form:
 - Certificate of French level B2 (DELF – DALF – attestation from the home university)
 - A CV in French
 - A letter of motivation in French
 - Previous academic transcripts
- ✓ Be admitted by the faculty of the Multilingual Natural Language Processing track

Course choice

Students accepted for the Multilingual Natural Language Processing track will be able to register for any undergraduate courses.

Professional Track Course: Master's Degree in Translation

Admission requirements

- ✓ Provide certification of the following level of French: C1 minimum acquired
- ✓ Include the following documents with the Application Form:
 - Certificate of French level C1 (DALF – attestation from the home university)
 - Certificate of English level C1
 - A CV in French
 - A letter of motivation in French
 - Previous academic transcripts
- ✓ Be admitted by the faculty of the Master's in Specialized Translation
- ✓ Be present during the first week of the course that starts the first week in September

Course choice

Students accepted for the Master's Degree in Translation will be able to register only to the courses of the first semester of the first year of the Master's Program.

The students accepted who provide CA level in English can enroll on courses taught in English.


